Our Graduate Career Services team helps students develop a proactive, individualized career development plan for their time at Notre Dame and beyond, allowing them to search for and secure career opportunities that best match their unique values, interests, personality, skills, needs, and goals. Whether remaining in higher education following a degree, or exploring options in business, government, nonprofit, NGOs, or other career paths of interest, Graduate Career Services supports our students in developing and reaching their short-term and long-term career goals.


PRIMARY FIRST DESTINATION ACTIVITY BY COLLEGE













GEOGRAPHIC LOCATIONS

Winter Career Fair | February 13, 2019, Dahnke Ballroom



Law School Fair | October 9, 2018 Dahnke Ballroom

In July 2018, the Center for Career Development began offering pre-law advising and expanded efforts in coordination with the Office for Undergraduate Studies. Anita Rees, Assistant Director of Undergraduate Career Services, was appointed to serve as a pre-law advisor.

Although discerning and exploring a career in law has been a core industry specialization in Undergraduate Career Services for many years, adding the role, knowledge, and resources for pre-law advising more fully integrated and enhanced career advising for students. Partnerships were strengthened with the College of Mendoza Pre-law Advisor, Notre Dame Law Admissions staff, and the College of Engineering Director of Undergraduate Studies, a resource for engineering students interested in patent law.

The Center for Career Development hosted the department's first Law School Fair in the Dahnke Ballroom on October 9. The fair was a great opportunity for students to meet face-to-face with law school admissions representatives from top schools across the country under one roof. Students were able to gather more information about attending law school, gain insight about navigating the application process, and ask questions to help take the next step.

For the first year of pre-law advising in Undergraduate Career Services, we implemented eight workshops; conducted our first Welcome Weekend presentation on pre-law to parents and entering freshman students; hosted 10 of the top 14 law schools on campus, including Harvard, Stanford and Georgetown; held approximately 150 pre-law advising appointments; conducted 19 personal statement **review sessions** and developed and implemented the first private practice, patent, and public interest law career treks, visiting larger law and public interest firms in Chicago, with **17 students participating**. These additional programs provided a full range of exploration and advising services to students considering law


Architecture Fair | March 20, 2019, Smith Ballroom

Over **60 architecture firms** filled the Smith Ballroom at the Morris Inn on March 20 for the School of Architecture's annual career fair. Forty-three graduating students met firms to explore full-time employment while a host of second-year, third-year, fourth-year, and graduate students sought summer positions.

The fair, coordinated by the School of Architecture, enabled students to learn about opportunities and build relationships with potential employers. Firms were provided an opportunity to find well-qualified candidates with skills in both hand drawing and computer rendering and a strong foundation in building technology, as well as theory.

On day one of the three-day event, firms and students met and exchanged resumes and information. On days two and three, firms conducted individual interviews with candidates. Representatives of the firms also had an opportunity to explore the School's new home, Walsh Family Hall of Architecture.

Regional Internship and Career Fair | April 17, 2019, Dahnke Ballroom



The Center for Career Development hosted its first ever Regional Internship and Career Fair on Wednesday, April 17 in the Dahnke Ballroom from 6 to 8 p.m. The event was created in recognition of the need for students who were staying near campus during the summer or were interested in living in the area permanently.

Our Employer Engagement team identified emlployers in the South Bend and Elkhart areas and invited them to participate in the fair. **Over 50 employers** came to campus in search of local talent for internships, full time, experiential, and job shadow opportunities.

Information Sessions are employer presentations that allow organizations to provide information about their company and available opportunities.

Office Hours are brief informational one-on-one meetings where students sign up to speak with an employer about their company, the industry, and/or basic information.



INTERVIEW CENTER

The Center for Career Development's interview center was established in January 2018 to serve Notre Dame students in all stages of the career development process through the use of a world-class facility. The interview center includes **45 rooms** spanning 100 yards across the 5th floor of the Duncan Student Center.

The Center features **36** interview rooms plus **11** additional conference rooms that can be used by recruiters for interviews. The interview rooms provide a total of **4,121** square feet (a **136%** increase in square footage from the former Career Center in Flanner Hall). The increase in space provides more opportunities for recruiters and organizations to come to campus to meet Notre Dame students.

In addition to these rooms, the Center offers a **1,900 square foot,** state-of-the-art training room with integrated technology. The room provides mobile tables and chairs, and the space can be divided into two smaller rooms for additional flexibility for events such as employer informational sessions, workshops for students, training sessions, receptions, and more.







Notre Dame California

The Notre Dame-California program seeks to elevate the state as a source and destination for Notre Dame student talent. It connects the University's top-flight faculty and student scholars as well as our premier programs to the dynamic employer ecosystem found on the West Coast. Notre Dame-California isn't simply a West Coast office, it is the embodiment of the University's desire to be an active partner and presence across the state, contributing to and benefitting from the educational, entrepreneurial, and creative cultures that make California unique. Establishing a presence in California allows Notre Dame to contribute its distinctive voice to the moral and ethical deliberations that inevitably arise in a landscape where the next big thing is always just around the corner.

Associate Vice President for Career and Professional Development, Ryan Willerton, kicked off the event, welcoming guests and sharing insights into the work of the Notre Dame career centers. A luncheon and networking session followed the talk.



Cotton Bowl Cocktails Event | Dallas, TX, Friday, December 28, 2018

The Center for Career Development, in collaboration with Graduate Business Career Services, held a networking event in Dallas, Texas, in advance of the University of Notre Dame football team's appearance in the College Football Playoff. "Cotton Bowl Cocktails," welcomed University administration, alumni of both the Graduate School and Graduate Business programs, as well as local and visiting employer partners, in appreciation for their partnership with the University and Career Services.

The event, attended by over 175 guests, preceded the football team's pep rally on Friday, December 28, and was held in a nearby restaurant, Bob's Steak & Chop House. Thanks to the event, both the Center for Career Development and Graduate Business Career Services were able to increase overall engagement while formulating new partnerships with passionate alums and employers to better serve current students beyond their education at Notre Dame. The event was extremely well received, with several opportunities (e.g., job postings and future conversations related to employment and overall partnerships) coming in the weeks following the event.





IrishCompass

IrishCompass is the University's official online mentoring and networking community where students connect with Notre Dame alumni to gain support and perspective as they navigate their careers. In true Notre Dame spirit, alumni can give back to fellow grads and current students by serving as a resource and sharing their professional experience. IrishCompass supports alumni and current students as they collaborate and grow professionally through group and individual connections. The community automatically generates natural



connections using an algorithm and offers flexible search fields that enable users to find and connect with fellow professionals. There are also more than 30 industry groups where participants can get answers to questions they share as part of group discussions.

Thanks to the efforts of staff members across four departments — the Center for Career Development, the Notre Dame Alumni Association, the Office of Information Technologies, and the Monogram Club — the community launched in 2017.



TEAM IRISH AWARD

In 2018, the IrishCompass implementation team received the Presidential Team Irish Award. The Award publicly recognizes staff teams whose work exemplifies the University's core values of integrity, accountability, teamwork, leadership in mission, and leadership in excellence.

10,881 member accounts on IrishCompass were reported at the end of the academic year. Of that number, **4,265** are currently students.

There are **290 total ongoing mentorships** on IrishCompass reported at the end of the Academic Year.

7,189 connections made on IrishCompass were reported at the end of the academic year. Connections include messages sent to request meetings, gain mentorships, and discuss career paths.

Moreau First Year Experience

The Moreau First Year Experience is inspired by the pedagogical vision of Blessed Basil Moreau, professor, priest, and founder of the Congregation of Holy Cross. A two-semester, graded course sequence helps new students to integrate their academic, co-curricular, and residential experiences. All first year students are required to participate in the Moreau course.

2,072 first year students attended the Moreau First Year Experience this past academic year where the Center for Career Development staff and colleagues introduced career services and early engagement in the career discernment process.

Engaging in the ProcessNetworking

Three staff members, Ryan Willerton, DeeDee Dolan, and LoriAnn Edinborough, served as Moreau instructors during the 2018-2019 Academic Year.



Student-Athlete Engagement

To best serve the 720 student-athletes on campus, the Center for Career Development hired Student-Athlete Career Development Program Manager James Biddick in July of 2018. Relationships were not only focused on student-athletes, but also on other internal and external stakeholders including athletic staff, academic services, alumni, donors, and employers (both local and national).

To respond to the unique demands faced by this population of students, Biddick created industry-specific programming for student-athletes. He also established an "in-house" presence with Notre Dame athletics teams, accommodated career services to fit the demanding schedules of student-athletes, collaborated with the Monogram Club, and developed a Sports Administration Notre Dame group for students.

INDUSTRY-SPECIFIC PROGRAMMING:

A healthcare panel and workshop **brought in alumni, professionals, and past student-athletes currently working in sports** to provide an opportunity for them to **learn more and make connections** in other industries.

OVERTIME PROGRAM

A significant initiative born out of findings from a survey at the beginning of the academic year, the Overtime Program is targeted at student-athletes who are unable to complete a traditional 8-12 week summer internship, but still wish to participate in experiential learning opportunities. Approximately **60 student-athletes applied to be part of the program,** noting their interests and availability, which were compiled and distributed to approximately 350 student-athlete friendly employers.

Currently, **30 offers have been extended** and are at varying stages of acceptance. This number is anticipated to increase as student-athletes return to campus in June to study and train, and are able to connect with local employers.

SPORTS INDUSTRY CAREER TREK

With the development of the Sports Administration Notre Dame (SAND) group, students interested in learning or working within the sports industry traveled to Chicago, IL for a day trek to learn more about the industry and to make connections by visiting the headquarters of the Chicago Blackhawks, Chicago Bulls, and 4Front.



The Chicago Sports Trek trip was **an amazing opportunity** that helped all of us gain connections within the organizations and also **provided us the potential to acquire internships**. Our leaders, Ali Hart and James Biddick, did a tremendous job preparing us for the trek and scheduling the events so that we could truly see everything the industry has to offer. First Gen Initiatives

Based on an identified need to better serve first generation students, the Center for Career Development established a student-driven First Generation Careers Initiative to provide tailored programming for first gen students and engage them in career development. This program is lead by Assistant Director Dee Dee Dolan Canelli and is supported by a student advisory board.

FIRST GEN, FIRST LOOK

73 students attended a student panel that provided an opportunity for first year, first generation students to hear from peer junior and senior first generation students about how they utilized resources including treks, funding, and discernment appointments.

FIRST GEN NETWORKING NIGHT

36 students were connected to first gen employers from **PwC**, **Teach for America**, **ACE**, **and Vanguard** in a networking event prior to the Winter Career Fair.

FIRST GEN, FIRST LOOK: BACKSTAGE PASS TO THE FALL CAREER FAIR

44 students attended the "early access" opportunity for first gen students. They were able to meet with employers and get a better understanding of how to navigate the Career Fair.

COLLABORATION WITH THE WALL STREET CLUB

The First Gen Careers Initiative hosted a "Wall Street Forum" prep session and Backstage Pass to the Wall Street Forum for first gen students. **29 students attended.** Employers included **Goldman Sachs, Bank of America, Morgan Stanley, Credit Suisse, Deutsche Bank, JP Morgan, and Citi.**

International Student Engagement

The Center for Career Development supports international students who adopt a global job search approach, taking advantage of resources to target internship, networking, and job opportunities in their home country, the United States, and other locations

Worked together with the Alumni Association to host an International Notre Dame Alumni Career Panel and Dinner featuring executive level alumni from five different countries.

Linked job postings including work authorization in GO IRISH to the ISSA newsletter to increase awareness about job and internship possibilities for international students.

Partnered with the Office of International Student

Scholar Affairs to host both spring and fall International Student Career Panel and Dinner.

50+ students participated.

Created an **International Career Assistant position** to provide focused attention to the unique challenges confronting international students' job and internship searches.

Public Policy & Government Career Trek

Washington, D.C. | October 14-17, 2018

The Public Policy & Government Career Trek was an opportunity for students to explore several of the primary industries in Washington, D.C., network with a large number of Notre Dame alumni, learn how industries connect, overlap, and are distinct from one another, and gain more information to make an informed career decision about desired internships or jobs. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors were eligible to participate in the Career Trek. **7 students** participated in the trek.

Silicon Valley PhD Career Trek | Silicon Valley, CA, February 24-March 1, 2019

Thanks to a partnership with the Graduate School, the Graduate Career Services team of the Center for Career Development offered an extended trek for PhD students. Trek leader Larry Milks, Graduate Career Consultant for the College of Engineering, outlined the goals in adopting career treks for students: become a grad careers pace-setter, provide opportunities for career discernment, create professional connections, and become a target school status.

Students participated in discussions with panelists from various PhD roles within organizations the group visited. They also were taken on facility tours to get a first-hand sense of the work environment and culture. For the 11th consecutive year, the department coordinated the Wall Street Externship program, which allows sophomores to spend two to eight weeks at a host firm (usually with a Notre Dame alum as a mentor) to gain hands-on experience working in a professional setting. The Competition also provides a valuable opportunity for all graduate students to come together, get to know one another, and talk about their research in a supportive environment in which Schools and Institutes can provide presentation skills training.




President's Circle Mentorship Program
